1:35 Legislative stuff

- 1. Governor's drought declaration
- 2. SB 5561: emergency drought funds
 - a. NUID would get \$5.5 million
 - b. OWEB would get 1.1 million for "grants for drought resiliency projects in Jefferson County"
 - c. JCSWCD would get 3 million "to support stewardship practices on irrigated land that is at high risk for erosion and soil degradation, and to limit proliferation of noxious and invasive weeds"
- 3. HB 2998: Soil Health = supports voluntary actions that improve soil health.
 - JCSWCD supports it, so does the Drought Group. Ellen testified in favor.
- 4. SB 530: Natural Climate Solutions = provides funding for voluntary actions that capture carbon.

- JCSWCD supports, so does Drought Group.
- 5. SB 58: tells OWRD to investigate cloud seeding for Oregon
 - NUID supports it, so does Drought Group. Not brought before JCSWCD Board yet.
- 6. HB3142: supports juniper eradication in central/southern Oregon
 - Supported by JCSWCD. SWCD staff testified in favor.
